HAUC was incorporated in March 2008. Committee meetings run bi-monthly and are held on Saturdays from 9.00-10.00am. Open Meetings run from 10.00-12.00 every month and each month there is a different speaker. These are supported by Auslan interpreters and a notetaker. Everyone is welcome to these meetings whether they are members of HAUC or not.
